This reading list is for guidance only and does not claim to be exhaustive or prescriptive. As you read, you will discover references to other books and articles which you may wish to investigate. You will also receive recommendations during your lectures on these subjects. You should get used to using your initiative and your judgement, and to searching in library holdings (including via the SOLO catalogue) for books and articles which will prove useful to you.

The two Golden-Age texts we study this term, in relation to various possible approaches to literature, need to be read and re-read, and it is essential to look up and learn words you do not understand. You may be required to translate or to write a commentary on passages from them in the examination. Lectures are also given on these texts by colleagues in the Spanish sub-faculty: you should attend these.

You **must use the appropriate editions where these are prescribed**, or you will be at a disadvantage (online links are include below as a back-up only). Make sure you read the introductory material. Please bring a copy of the relevant book with you to tutorials. We shall study them in the order given here:

Reading List - Hilary Term

During this term we shall be studying the history and development of one literary genre, the Spanish ballad (*romance*), from its origins in the Middle Ages, through its transformations by Golden-Age and Romantic poets, and into the twentieth century.

The texts we shall be studying are not prescribed texts in the sense that you will be asked to translate and comment on extracts from them. You are required to have a good knowledge of them, and to understand the origins of the various kinds of *romances* and the ways in which they have developed.

Trinity Term (weeks 1-4)

In the first part of this term we shall be studying Antonio Machado's *Campos de Castilla* (with *Elogios*), and Mario Vargas Llosa's *La Fiesta del Chivo* (Alfaguara, 2000). You will need to prepare these carefully, as translations and commentaries will be set from these texts, the remaining texts in Paper III (the others are *El médico de su honra* and 'Rinconete y Cortadillo'). The remainder of the teaching term (weeks 5-7) will be devoted to revision.
