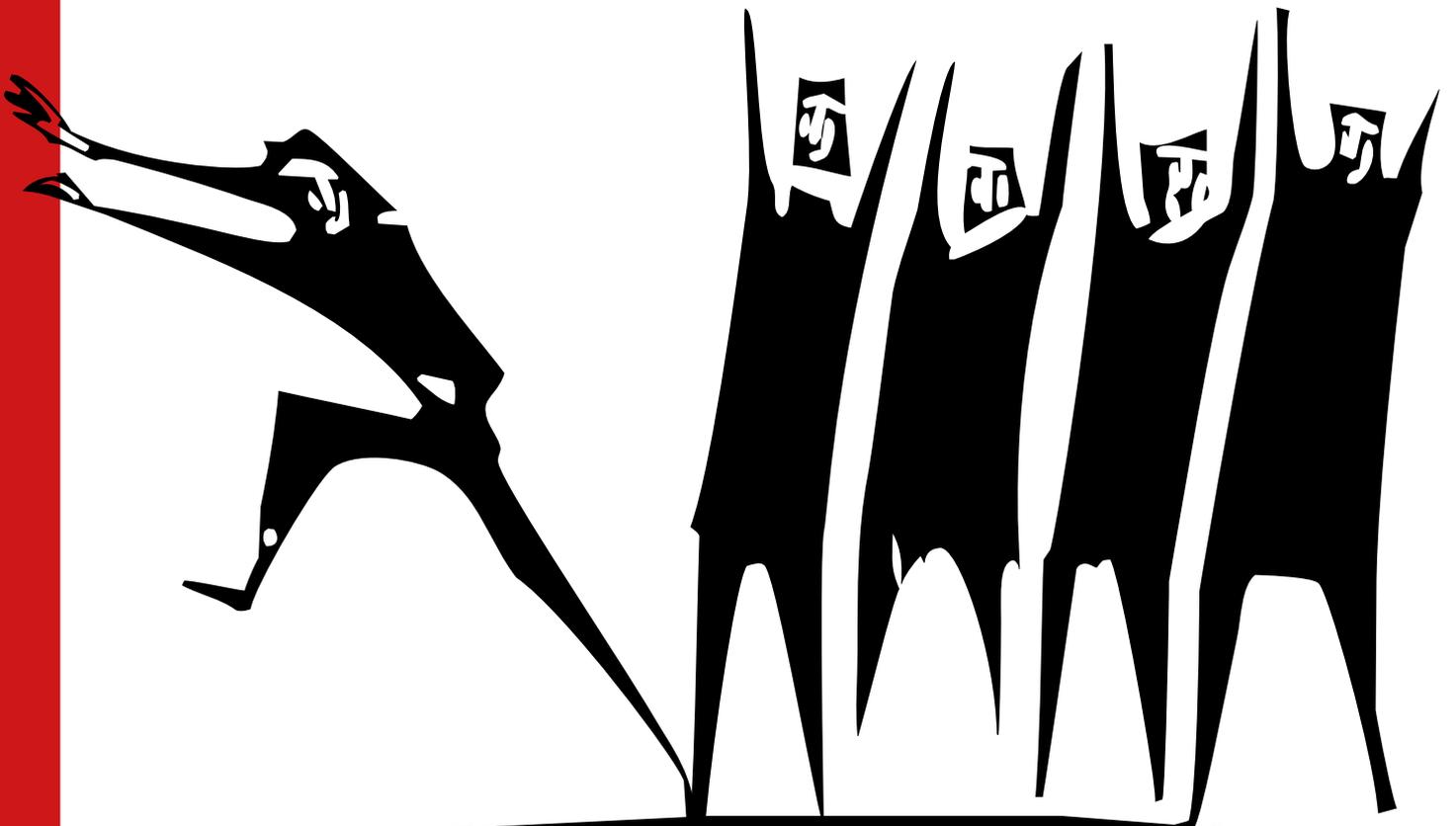

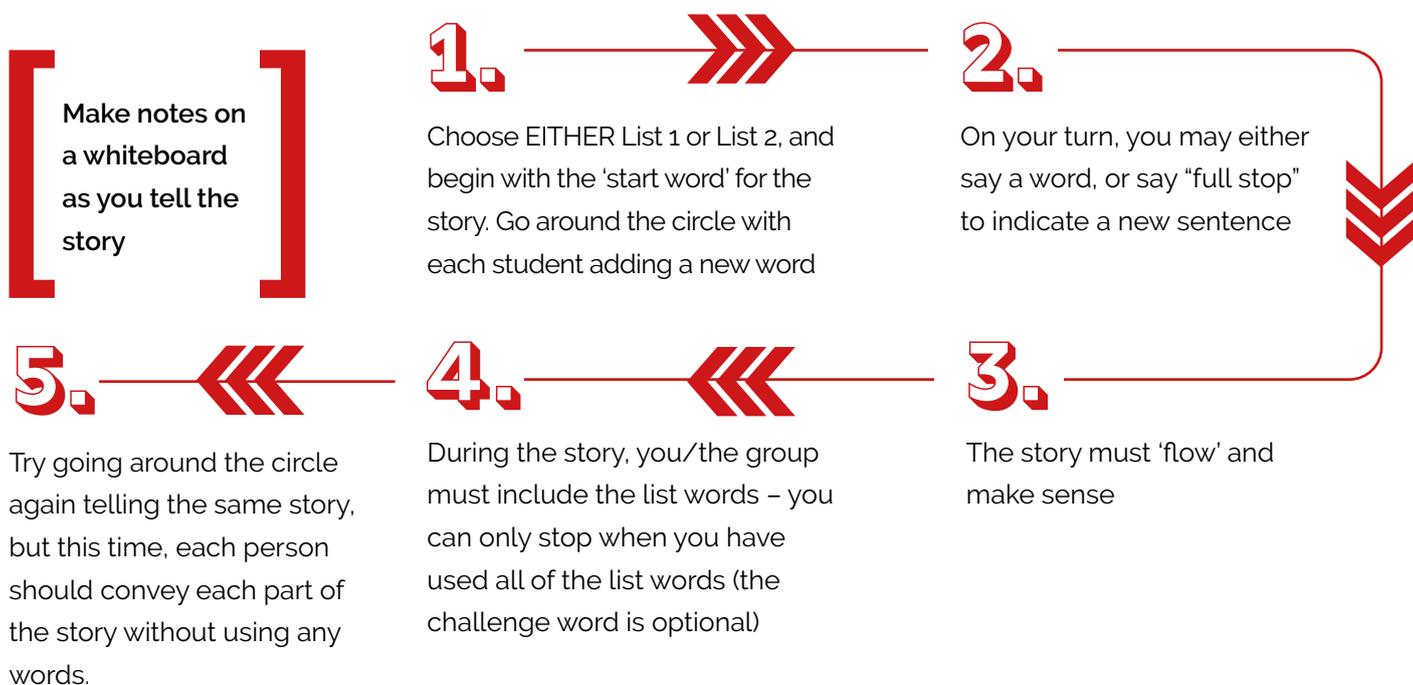

# PHYSICAL THEATRE

What is physical theatre? One definition is:

*Physical theatre is a form of theatre which emphasises the use of physical movement, as in dance and mime, for expression. It can be used alongside words, for example to bring out the emotional subtext of a performance, or instead of words. It is often abstract in style.*

# GECKO THEATRE COMPANY

Gecko was founded by its Artistic Director Amit Lahav in 2001. The company creates bold, physical theatre that strives to capture human experiences.

Every element of a Gecko show is carefully crafted, from the physical movements of the performers to the

costumes, the sound, the lighting and the stage design. Because they are so intricately crafted and do not have a traditional script, each production takes three years to make!

Gecko says that watching one of their shows should be like falling into a dream, with symbols and metaphors standing in for other experiences. Dreams are very personal experiences, so there is no right or wrong interpretation of a Gecko show – it is very much up to the individual audience member to find their own meanings.

## HOW GECKO DEFINES PHYSICAL THEATRE

*'Physical theatre is a broad term which can apply to a wide range of styles, from dance focused work that has a strong theatrical language, to text-based theatre that incorporates movement. For us physical theatre is a theatrical world that doesn't primarily use words to impart narrative or understanding. It is a world in which metaphor is central to the language. This allows us to use a multitude of theatrical devices including movement, puppetry, object manipulation and acted scenes that help to develop the journey.'*

# THE OVERCOAT (2009-2011)

## WATCH



Main character Akakki works in a government department. The work they do there is boring and pointless. He is in love with his beautiful colleague, Natalia, but she does not reciprocate his feelings. Akakki thinks that she will like him if he is successful, so he competes to win the office prize of the overcoat.

Many of the physical sequences in the performance represent Akakki's fantasies and emotions, rather than telling a linear narrative. Each of the seven characters speaks in a different language, so that the emphasis is on the images and atmosphere rather than the words.

The show was inspired by Nikolai Gogol's short story, 'The Overcoat'. In the story, a clerk in a government department saves up for a new overcoat from his small salary, only for it to be stolen from him the first night he wears it.

Watch the clip from Gecko's show, *The Overcoat*. In groups, discuss the following questions:

What do you think is going on in this section of the show? Is there anything you can't explain? Is there anything else you notice about the performance?

Write down one image or movement that you found particularly effective. What do you think it was communicating?

# YOUR PHYSICAL THEATRE

## ACT IT OUT

Now it is your turn to try devising your own, 2-3-minute physical theatre piece.

In your group, choose a scenario card. As a group, write a three-sentence story in response to the scenario with a **beginning, middle and end**. There's space to write down your story on the next page, with an example. The story is not the focus of the exercise, so don't spend too long on this part and keep it as simple as possible.

Next, as a group construct **3 freeze-frames representing the scenario – one each for the beginning, middle and end**.

The images in the freeze-frame can represent the story naturalistically like a photograph or be more abstract and use metaphors. For example, if you were creating a freeze-frame of a teenage character having to choose which of his/her parents to live with after a divorce, you could create an image of the teenager being pulled between his/her parents. This might focus the audience's attention more on the emotions of the character.

Once you have generated your freeze frames, your group should work on the transitions between the freeze frames to make them fluid movements. This should create a 2-3-minute performance piece. Make sure you rehearse the whole piece at least once.
